



THE CIVIL WAR

Abraham Lincoln was elected President five days after the cemetery opened in November 1860. The North and the South were at war six months later. There are more than 100 Civil War veterans buried in the cemetery. 28 soldiers with a local connection are especially remembered on the Civil War Monument *Fame*.

The Statue of *Fame*

Raised in marble in 1866, Sculptor Isaac Broome, Esquire, cost \$5800; replaced in granite in 2005, sculptor Stanislaw Lutostanski, cost \$300,000. The original marble statue of *Fame* may be seen in the cemetery chapel.
